DEAR FRIENDS OF FLORENCE CRITTENTON,

Looking back on the past year, the cornerstones of Florence Crittenton's mission — safety, hope and opportunity — have never rung truer. While the economy bounced from signs of recovery to further downfall, we provided a beacon in the struggle of adversity for the at-risk girls and young women in our community.

This year, the waiting lists for our Transitional Living program continually remained steady with at least 25 girls and young women vying to enter the program at any given time. We also responded to increased requests for even the most basic of needs — shelter, transportation and education.

Considering the need to create more prevention services, we launched Girls For A Change — a program designed to equip girls with the tools, resources and support they need to realize their full potential. We also look forward to opening our Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona in August 2011, the state's first all-girls public charter high school, available to all girls in our community who want early college access.

Looking ahead, we addressed the need to ensure Florence Crittenton will remain a place of safety, hope and opportunity for years to come. As such, we began building an endowment to sustain our programs and services for girls and young women who have nowhere else to go.

We continue to be amazed by the incredible group of compassionate, dedicated people — both employees and volunteers — who dig deep each day to fulfill our mission. Together, we are making a difference in the lives of these girls and young women and creating a brighter, positive future for each of them.

Florence Crittenton remains steadfast now more than ever to providing safety, hope and opportunity to the at-risk girls in our community. While we have achieved success, we cannot rest on our accomplishments. Instead, we will continue to find creative ways to meet the increasing demands for our programs, while maintaining the highest level of service.

YEAR FOUNDED 1896

PROGRAMS

Florence Crittenton's programs provide individual, group and family counseling for girls and young women in challenged and destructive situations while promoting responsibility, accountability, education, job readiness, positive parenting skills and financial literacy.

INTERVENTION

THERAPEUTIC GROUP HOME

Four 10-bed cottages provide a safe haven for 200 girls ages 10-18 annually and includes:

- Counseling services
- On-site medical services
- Education
- Basic needs

GIRLS RANCH

A group home for parenting girls ages 12-18 who need:

- Independent living skills
- Parenting skills
- Home management skills

PERMANENCY

TRANSITIONAL LIVING PROGRAM

Safe, affordable housing for girls who have aged out of Arizona's foster care system and includes:

- Money management training
- Job training and counseling
- Educational planning

COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES

Individualized, home-based skills development and case management that helps nearly 500 youth achieve self-sufficiency either via Life Skills or Independent Living programs that teach:

- Goal setting and decision making
- Money management
- Educational planning
- Job seeking and maintenance

PREVENTION

MENTORING

- **Girls For A Change** - works with volunteers and 250 teens to teach skills that empower teen girls to create and lead social change in their own communities
- **WINGS** - a volunteer mentor program that matches approximately 45 at-risk girls annually with responsible, caring adult women from our community

BRINGING HOPE TO LIFE

For 115 years, Florence Crittenton has provided safety, hope and opportunity to girls, young women and their families. Over the years we have evolved from a home for unwed mothers to meeting a full range of needs for young women in challenging and destructive environments. As the oldest social service agency in the state, today we offer a safe place where young women and their families can discover the support of a caring community and the opportunity for a bright, new future.

THERAPEUTIC GROUP HOME

They can be as young as 10 years old. Some suffer cruelty beyond comprehension at the hands of a trusted family member. Others lack the basic support and nurturing that every child deserves. What they all have in common is the need for a safe environment — free from trauma and abuse.

Florence Crittenton's Therapeutic Group Home provides the safety some girls desperately need, giving them the steps toward their healing journey. With a team of on-site therapists, behavioral health technicians, medical professionals, teachers, and support staff, the girls placed in the Therapeutic Group Home at Florence Crittenton find the stability they need to regain control of their lives — and their futures.

Most common reasons for Therapeutic Group Home placement:

- Mental Health Issues
- Abuse/Trauma
- Delinquency





SHARON'S STORY

Sharon didn't have the typical childhood experience. Instead, her young life consisted of sexual abuse, eventually leading her to use drugs to escape the trauma.

Sharon attended a rehab center that proved to be ineffective in dealing with her emotional trauma, and was placed at Florence Crittenton's Therapeutic Group Home. At first she was uncertain, but in five months, she made progress in changing her behavior and regaining control of her life. She began to rebuild her relationship with her mother, as well as her siblings.

Before receiving treatment at Florence Crittenton, her outlook on life was filled with despair. Today, the 15-year-old is brimming with hope and has the support and tools in place to help her succeed. Sharon aspires to own a business one day and to extend to others the kindness that has been shown to her.

CASEY'S STORY

Casey never expected the support she received while living in Florence Crittenton's Transitional Living home. With no mother in her life and the sudden loss of her father, she found herself homeless and without anyone to support her. Operating in survival mode, she spent the better part of a year moving from place to place.

Depression set in, Casey dropped out of high school and found herself surrounded by negative influences. Her relationships with boys turned abusive and eventually she became pregnant. Faced with raising a child alone and on the streets, she knew she needed help.

At 18—too old for the state's foster care system and with no family—Casey began searching the Internet for help. She contacted countless agencies for assistance. Her choice became clear: *Florence Crittenton was the answer.*

Here Casey found counselors to help her deal with the grief of losing her dad. She also learned to balance her checkbook and prioritize her bills as well as many other basic life skills. Equally important, she had a whole team of experts to support her and help her prepare for a successful future.

Today, Casey is eager to begin the next exciting chapter of her life. She plans to attend college so that she can be a social worker and help others. Thanks to her own hard work and the staff and volunteers at Florence Crittenton, she knows anything is possible.

Most common reasons girls come to our Transitional Living program:

- Come from the foster care program after turning 18 and have no preparation for independent living
- Lack of family support
- Homeless and lacking the skills and encouragement to make a positive change

TRANSITIONAL LIVING

Florence Crittenton's Transitional Living program is one of the few gender-specific programs of its kind in Arizona. Here, the young women who participate in the program live in one of three Transitional Living homes and receive the support and the opportunity to achieve their dreams. Many young women come to the program upon turning 18 when they age out of the state's foster care system. They are faced with living on their own with little to no preparation for what it takes to become a responsible, productive member of our community.

Other young women seek help in the Transitional Living program because their family support system is failing: Their mothers have boyfriends or addictions that are more important than their daughters or their only caregivers pass away, leaving them alone and vulnerable. Through Transitional Living, young women gain the skills and confidence they need to break these cycles and find their way back to living their dreams.



I LEARNED WHO I REALLY AM

Independent Living program provided **10,936 hours** of individualized instruction to young people and their families.

GIRLS RANCH

Florence Crittenton commits to providing safety, hope and opportunity to every girl whose life we touch. Through our Girls Ranch facility in Scottsdale, we offer these very things for parenting girls, ages 12–18 who have no family support. Girls Ranch is a home environment with private parenting suites and shared common areas for play, interaction and group classes. It is a safe place for girls to develop their day-to-day living and parenting skills, while sharing in the responsibilities of planning and preparing meals, home management and caring for others.

A highly successful program, Girls Ranch also specializes in mother-child reunions and in giving vulnerable, young moms the life skills and parenting skills they desperately need to create a healthy successful future for themselves and their babies.

JENNY'S STORY

Raising a child has its challenges for any parent. It is especially tough when the parent struggles not only financially, but also with mental illness. As a single mom at 23, Jenny was living with bipolar disorder and lacked the self-esteem and self-confidence to be a good mother to her daughter. She knew she needed help and found it through Florence Crittenton's Community-Based Services.

Jenny's dedicated case manager helped her overcome her low self-esteem and find better coping mechanisms to deal with life's hurdles. Jenny also developed parenting skills, and learned about the community resources available to help her be a better mother to her child.

Motivated by the love for her child, Jenny worked hard to overcome her struggles and to make positive changes that will remain with her throughout her life. Today she is happily married and focused on being the best possible mother she can be.

COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES

The truth is there are more girls and young women who need Florence Crittenton's help than we have space for in our Therapeutic Group Home and Transitional Living homes. But they can still find safety, hope and opportunity through our Community-Based Services.

Divided into Life Skills and Independent Living training, Florence Crittenton extends our reach into the community by providing individualized, home-based skill development and case management to achieve self-sufficiency. Case management services include goal setting and decision making, money management, education and career planning, job seeking and job maintenance. The young women also learn to identify safe and affordable housing.

GIRLS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY OF ARIZONA

Florence Crittenton's Board of Directors and staff made history by working with the Arizona State Legislature to create the Crittenton Bill, allowing single-gender public charter schools to legally exist. This paved the way for plans to open the new Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona, which will empower young women in grades 9–12 to succeed as leaders at school, in their communities and in their own lives.

Inspired by a vision that all young women have the opportunity to develop as leaders, Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona offers a new academically competitive option for single gender education that is completely free. The mission of Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona is to provide young women an opportunity to achieve high school and college success simultaneously while nurturing self-confidence and developing leadership skills in an academically rigorous environment.

Beginning in fall 2011, our vision to serve more girls will come to fruition. Young women attending Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona can earn college credits while in high school, develop leadership skills and learn to lead change in their community through service learning and civic engagement.

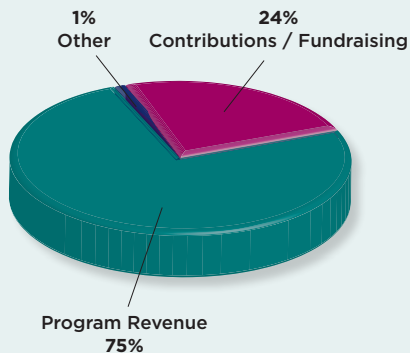

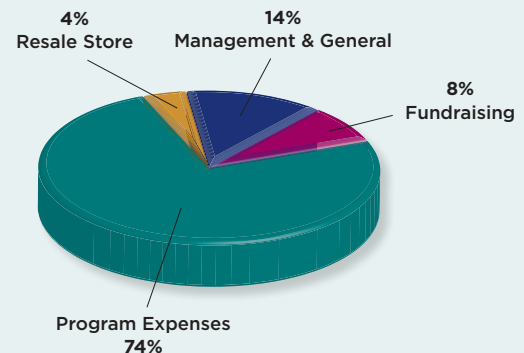

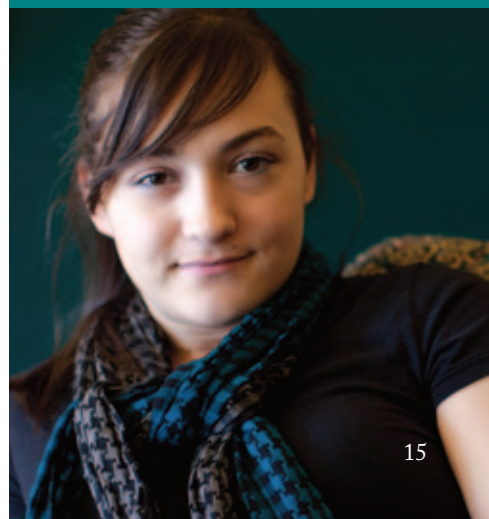
