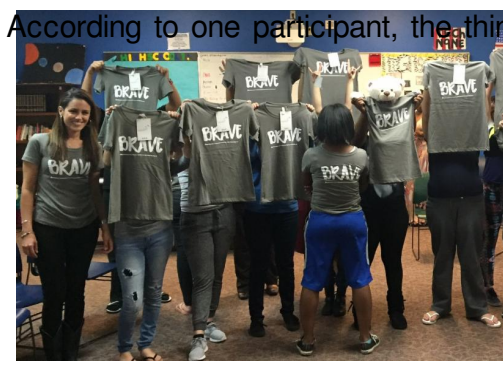
INSPIRE Program

Coming from a variety of challenging backgrounds, Florence Crittenton's clients tend to relate to one another, but have few opportunities to connect with positive adults outside of their staff and treatment team. INSPIRE gives them that opportunity.



Thank you to our wonderful panelists for sharing their inspirational stories on our monthly INSPIRE program, which are women inspiring the girls of Florence Crittenton through personal stories of life's overwhelming challenges...and eventual triumphs.

On March 23, Erica Cardenas, Founder of inspireHER, shared her story with Florence Crittenton's clients. InspireHER is a movement that works to empower girls to recognize their value and purpose, and the company spreads that message through shirts. After sharing some of the struggles Erica overcame as a teenager, she gifted participants with shirts declaring "brave"- a word she hopes the girls learn to identify with themselves.

The Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona

On Friday, March 4th, nine students from the Girls Leadership Academy of Arizona went to The Walter Cronkite School of Journalism at Arizona State University in Downtown Phoenix.

The day began with a warm welcome from Anita Luera, the director of the High School Journalism Institute and a Skype press conference with Congresswoman Kyrsten Sinema.



The day was filled with unique experiences, including a presentation about the infamous "Curtain of Distraction" and skill-building workshops. These sessions targeted writing in Spanish, finding your voice in radio broadcasting, social media best practices and ethics in journalism.

At the end of day, awards were given out to several students in the workshops, which included two from the GLAAZ.
