Florence Crittenton Receives a \$150,000 Grant to Support Mentoring

Virginia G. Piper Charitable Trust Makes Generous Contribution

PHOENIX — Florence Crittenton is pleased to announce it has been awarded a \$150,000 grant from Virginia G. Piper Charitable Trust. These funds will support the agency's WINGS (Women Involved in Nurturing Girls' Self-Esteem) mentoring program, which pairs caring adult female mentors with at-risk and disadvantaged girls who receive residential treatment services.

"We are honored to receive support for our mentoring program that has been around since 1999," said Chief Executive Office Dr. Kellie M. Warren. "The mentoring program empowers our girls and young women through healthy adult relationships, and it encourages each of our girls to find their own voice. This generous contribution will help maximize the program's impact on so many young women."

The WINGS program targets girls and young women, ages 10-18, within Maricopa County. Support from Virginia G. Piper Charitable Trust helps increase sustainability and provides critical gap funding for this program. The grant will help enhance mentor recruitment and training and expand the program's reach to serve more mentees.
