## GIRLS RANCH PHOENIX OPENS

#### IN ALIGNMENT WITH THE AGENCY'S

**VISION** of serving all girls in need, Florence Crittenton opened a new Girls Ranch facility in February 2014, located in Phoenix. As a part of Florence Crittenton's programming, Girls Ranch adheres to Arizona's Behavioral Health Residential Facility (BHRF) licensing



standards and provides supportive housing and comprehensive services for girls, ages 12 to 18, who are in need of independent living. The original Scottsdale location experienced heightened demand for services, largely prompted by a disturbing and monumental rise in child abuse and neglect in Arizona. As

of July 2013, more than 14,600 children were in out-of-home care due to abuse or neglect—the highest number in Arizona history and a 43 percent increase since 2010 (AZ Department of Economic Security). Over the past year, Girls Ranch Scottsdale has

consistently run well over full capacity and maintains a constant waiting list of a minimum of 12 girls in desperate need for services. By adding the additional facility, the agency anticipates the Girls Ranch program to serve more than 45 girls annually.

"We are really excited about the opening of Girls Ranch Phoenix! There is such a high demand in our community for safe and stable housing where youth can develop independent living skills," said Ashley Faye, Florence Crittenton's Clinical Case Manager. Historically, Girls Ranch has served both

> pregnant and/or parenting teens as well as non-parenting clients. "With a second facility, we are able to dedicate Girls Ranch Scottsdale for our pregnant and parenting clients and the Phoenix location for nonparenting clients. With

this expansion, we are able to better serve our clients with their specific needs," Fave said.

The program offers a hands-on approach for clients to learn essential skills ranging from job-readiness, fiscal responsibility and

## GRANT ANNOUNCEMENTS

preparing healthy meals. Clients continue their education by attending a local school or GED classes. They also may take additional classes to assist with credit recovery.

Due to the proximity of Florence Crittenton's main campus, Girls Ranch Phoenix has become a natural transition for clients in the Therapeutic Group Home in need of a lower level of care. "Many of the girls who have graduated from the Therapeutic Group Home Program are still in need of a program that helps them develop independent living skills. They are often placed in another group home and the change can be challenging. With Girls Ranch Phoenix, girls who completed the Therapeutic Group Home Program often work with the same staff and the program is very similar. The continuity is very beneficial

for the girls' transition," explained Faye.

## ATHLETIC PROGRAM INTRODUCED AT THE GIRLS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY OF ARIZONA

### THE GIRLS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY OF ARIZONA is

excited to formally introduce an athletic program as a part of the school's menu of extracurricular activities. The school, which opened in the fall of 2011, has provided the opportunity for students to dictate their own high school experience. Many of the clubs and afterschool activities have been created by the efforts and interests of the motivated student body. "The girls shared how important it was for them to have a sports program, so the staff listened and asked the students if they

asked the students if they could guarantee 20 athletes for a softball team. We now have 23 athletes on our roster," said Patt Jackson, director of curriculum and education, and newly appointed athletic director.

The athletic program was funded through the generous donations of the school tax credit drive. "We have noticed so many positive changes for our students since this program has been introduced. Our student athletes have seen an improvement in their grades and have really embraced the new leadership opportunities that result from being on a team. School spirit has been contagious; our students have even started a Pep Squad," said Jackson.
